February 7, 1940 **Business section burns**

At about 2:40 a.m., residents awoke to find the Robertson's General Store on fire. Flames soon spread to two houses, two stores, and a hot dog stand. Townspeople formed a bucket brigade to carry water using every available pot, pan, bucket, or tub. The Raleigh Fire Department sent a pumper that got stuck in the mud on Smithfield Road and didn't arrive until 4:30 a.m. Several buildings were still saved including the post office, a drug store, and a beauty salon.

The first permanent fire station was a two-bay concrete-block building erected on a town lot and included a large room rented to the town for office space. It housed a 1940s Ford 1 1/2-ton truck with hose and ladders for fires inside the town, and a 1942 GMC/Darley pumper for rural calls.

Two full-time firefighters were added in April 1990 for weekdays, a Firefighter I and the Fire Chief as a Firefighter II. Paid part-time personnel were soon added to supplement staffing.

1997 - First Responder added Starting January 1, 1997, KVFD took Rescue services added over the role of rescue services provider from Knightdale Area EMS.

Jan. 2020 – EWFD members vote to continue merger discussions and seek action date of July 1. Feb. & March 2020 – Public meetings held to receive feedback and answer questions. March & May 2020 – EWFD Board and membership vote to cease operations and merge with town. Jun 2020 – Town enters into agreement with county, for protection of Alert Fire District.
