

The RALEIGH RESCUE SQUAD, long a dream, is now a reality. Men pictured and named in the above photograph make up the Charter Membership of this squad. It has been a recognized fact that for sometime the City of Raleigh and the surrounding community has badly needed the services of a rescue squad. A rescue squad being generally defined as a group of men trained in the knowledge of first aid and life saving work. A rescue squad would normally be equipped with a squad truck carrying equipment of first aid materials, gas masks, boats, drag lines, burn kits, and all other similar types of equipment needed for various and sundry types of accidents and rescue work. A rescue squad does its work from the time the accident happens until a doctor arrives to take charge of the problem. In many instances the work of a rescue squad has to be continued on the scene for a number of hours before the injured can be prepared for removal to hospitals, etc. Furthermore, a rescue squad is of extreme value in the event of major disasters or catastrophes such as train wrecks, explosions, etc., in which a large number of people are injured.

Although its permanent housing awaits the completion of the Central Fire Station and being short on having its equipment on hand, the squad is nevertheless very active. On the first and third Wednesday nights of each month the squad meets and studies emergency equipment and rescue problems.

A new completely equipped rescue squad truck is on order and expected to be delivered within ^{the} next three or four months. The squad has a resuscitator available and a complete set of padded splints, including spinal fracture boards made by its members, also two outboard motors. It is expected that two boats will be acquired some time in July to equip the squad for water emergencies.

When the squad receives its needed equipment and is properly housed at Central Fire Station most any kind of accident or injury will find a ready helping hand from trained First Aid and Rescue Men.

Ass't. Chief Keeter stated he would be glad to have any man in Raleigh who might be interested in voluntary emergency rescue work and in becoming a member of the Raleigh Rescue Squad contact him at No. 1 Fire Station.

RALEIGH RESCUE SQUAD BEING ORGANIZED

It has been a recognized fact that for sometimes the City of Raleigh and the surrounding community has badly needed the services of a rescue squad. A rescue squad being generally defined as a group of men trained in the knowledge of first aid and life saving work. A rescue squad would normally be equipped with a squad truck carrying equipment of first aid materials, gas masks, boats, drag lines, burn kits, and all other similar types of equipment needed for various and sundry types of accidents and rescue work. A rescue squad does its work from the time the accident happens until a doctor arrives to take charge of the problem. In many instances the work of a rescue squad has to be continued on the scene for a number of hours before the injured can be prepared to removal to hospitals, etc. Furthermore, a rescue squad is of extreme value in the event of major disasters or catastrophes such as train wrecks, explosions, etc. in which a large number of people are injured.

Practically every community of any size in Virginia, Maryland, Delaware and many of the North Carolina cities rescue squads of this nature have already been established.

Efforts were made some few years back to get a squad started but the spark did not catch and these efforts spearheaded largely by the interest of Ass't. Fire Chief Keeter, Capt. Pavlovsky of the Police Department and others have kept the idea alive. After con-

Since City Manager W. H. Carper came to Raleigh and learned that no such organization existed work was started towards reviving the idea of a rescue squad and since that time much groundwork has been laid towards this goal. Mr. Carper having had organized three rescue squads in various Virginia cities and leading these squads into a successful program requested Fire Chief Lloyd, Ass't Chief Keeter and some others to make a trip to some of these cities, in Virginia and also on their trip to visit the Greensboro and Winston-Salem squads. These men came back with information that has proven helpful in getting the squad here started. All of this background work pointed up to a meeting held last Friday evening, January 9th in which around thirty firemen, policemen and civilians including two medical doctors met at the invitation from Ass't Chief Keeter for the purpose of starting towards the organization of a rescue squad. Ass't Chief Keeter was appointed temporary Chairman and during the program an extensive discussion was carried out as to the actions and purposes of a rescue squad. The group then took its first step towards the developing of a squad organizing and appointing an instructor for a thirty-two hours course in American Red Cross First Aid. This course will be the qualifying course for charter members to this squad. Upon the completion of this course, it is proposed that these men then adopt a Constitution By-Laws, elect officers and begin the activity of getting the equipment together. This course is under the supervision of Russell Cobb Nicholson, American Red Cross First Aid Instructor. The basic items of equipment, namely the squad truck and boats have been authorized in the current city budget by the City Council. Other items of first aid and emergency equipment may be received through donations from various places of business if they so wish. The squad will house its equipment at the new central

fire station on Dawson Street which equipment will be directed to the scenes of the accident by two trained first aid firemen assigned to this duty. Additional first aid help will be brought into the scene immediately through the means of telephone communication.

It has been proven beyond doubt in many other cities, both large and small, that a rescue squad has been the means of reducing injury, holding down unnecessary suffering and actually saving the lives of many many people. In addition to this part of the rescue squad's activities, an even greater job is done through its educational and safety program efforts in the tremendous task of helping to prevent accidents before they happen. If experiences in other communities hold true, Raleigh will be proud of its new rescue squad.

Back in 1947—several men had a dream. Today, as 1953 becomes established this dream is to be consummated. Former Fire Chief W. R. Butts, Ass't. Chief Jack Keeter and others came to the astute conclusion that we needed a rescue squad. An organization of trained men properly equipped to handle disaster cases. Other communities had the, ^{Why}—Why not Raleigh reasoned these men. Then came a change of administration and nothing constructive concerning this matter was accomplished. Time elapsed—but the idea did not suffocate.

After Bill Carper had become City Manager the subject arose again. This time there was more than just interest manifest~~ed~~ in the need of our community to be properly prepared in case of dire emergency. City Manager Carper is a man of action. He had organized similar units in Culpepper and Fredericksburg, Virginia, and they had been successful. Mr. Carper asked Jack Keeter to drop by—he did and these two men of vision convinced of the necessity of such a project determined to act promptly. Ass't. Chief Keeter and Fire Chief A. B. Lloyd ^{were} sent on an exploratory mission to ascertain the merits of various organizational systems in neighboring communities. They studied the setup in Winston-Salem and Greensboro, N. C. and Lynchburg, Danville, Roanoke and Martinsville, Va. They returned to Raleigh with glowing accounts of the success of these squads, and, of course, became more enthused by realization of the fact that their desire would soon become an actuality.

The City Council approved the plan by allowing an appropriation in the budget for the purchase of equipment.

At an organizational meeting Friday night in the City Court Room, Representatives of the Fire and Police Departments met with private emergency groups, Civil Defense Authorities, the Red Cross, Physicians and other interested citizens. The group decided to purchase a Rescue Truck, Two Boats and all proper equipment necessary to do the job.

The equipment will include--all 1st Aid Material--Oxygen tank and mask, electric saws, drills, etc. Ass't. Chief Keeter was elected temporary Chairman at the meeting. The meeting was responsible for the establishment of a first aid training course to be initiated Thursday, January 15th. The course is under the supervision of Russell Cobb Nicholson, an authorized Red Cross instructor. The permanent organization will be inaugurated upon the completion of this unit of instruction. This instructive course will be presented gratuitously for 8 weeks, four hours a week.

The prime purpose of this class is the indoctrination of Rescue Squad members in the latest techniques of 1st aid and life-saving. The Rescue Squad will include from 40-50 men super^bly trained in all phases of Rescue activity. The special truck will be manned by 4 regular firemen splitting a 24 hour shift. In this way the truck will be in constant operation to serve in cases of disaster.

Thus--A vision becomes a reality.

Article I
Qualification of Members

An applicant wishing to join the Squad shall have passed the standard first aid course or the equivalent thereof, as determined by the Squad.

He must be a person of good character. He must master the equipment and pass the required course of first aid as specified by the Squad.

The applicant shall have attained the age of 19 years in order to be eligible for membership.

Applications for membership shall lay on the table two weeks before being voted on during which time the application shall be considered by the membership committee for recommendation of rejection or approval to the Squad.

Article II
Meetings

There shall be a meeting of the Squad held as often as twice each month at 7:30 P.M. in the Squad Hall.

One-half the total number of active members shall constitute a quorum, which quorum shall be necessary to legally transact all business which may require a body vote.

Article III
Conduct of Members

A Squad member shall at all times conduct himself in such manner as will command the respect of the Squad officers and public in general.

A Squad member shall not take part in any activity of the Squad while under the influence of intoxicants, partially or completely.

A Squad member shall not permit the use of this badge or any other identification by any person not a member, or use the same himself in any way in violation of these by-laws or in a manner embarrassing to the Squad.

Article IV
General Rules

(a) Any member taking a piece of equipment out for service shall first notify the officer in charge; except that this shall not apply to the use of the equipment in cases of emergency or in answer to calls made through the regular channels.

(b) When a call is answered each member shall report to an officer of the Squad as soon as possible.

(c) A member willfully destroying, defacing or misusing equipment or other property of the Squad shall be fined an amount sufficient to replace same.

(d) Keys, badges, other Squad identifications and equipment shall at all times remain the property of the Squad and any member leaving the service of the Squad, for reason, shall immediately turn the same over to the Squad Captain or officer in charge.

(e) A member shall at all times observe city traffic regulations when answering calls in a private car.

(f) The equipment of the Squad shall be available for use:

1. By the members of the Squad in taking care of any emergency.
2. Equipment is not to be used for the benefit or convenience of a private individual when an emergency or need for Squad assistance does not exist.

Article V
Dismissal of Members

(a) Should it become necessary to dismiss a member it shall be done by secret ballot at a regular meeting of the Squad members. A three-fourths vote of the active members present shall be required for dismissal.

Article VI
Committees

Executive: Shall consist of the Captain, First Lieutenant, Second Lt., Equipment Manager, Secretary and Treasurer. The captain shall be chairman, and shall call meetings whenever it is deemed necessary by him.

Program: The Captain shall act as Chairman of the Program Committee. He shall be responsible for programs at drill and any special event designated by the presiding officer.

Membership: The First Lt. shall be Chairman of the Membership Committee, and shall appoint two other members of the Squad to act with him. Duties of this committee shall be to investigate an application for membership and make a report of its findings back to the Squad.

Finance: There shall be a Finance Committee consisting of three officers and two Squad members.

Appointment of the foregoing committees shall be made at the first meeting in January and all committee members shall serve for a period of one year.

Article VII
Penalties

Any Squad member violating any one or all of the foregoing By-Laws shall after investigation and fair trial by the Executive Committee, be subject to such penalty as may be prescribed by a majority of the Squad.

Any member (except those excused) who is absent from three consecutive meetings will be written a letter by the secretary to be present at the next regular meeting to explain his absence. If he then fails to appear at the next meeting, he may be dropped from the roll and requested to turn in his equipment.

Article VIII
Amendments

These By-Laws may be amended, repealed, or added to, by a three-fourths vote of the members of the Squad at a regular meeting. The proposed amendment, repeal or addition to the By-Laws must lay on the table for a period of two weeks before being voted on.

Election of Officers

CONSTITUTION
of the
RALEIGH EMERGENCY RESCUE SQUAD

Article I

The Name of the Organization shall be the Raleigh Emergency-Rescue Squad.

Article II

The object of the Squad is to save lives, administer first aid and teach methods of safety.

Article III

The maximum membership of the Squad shall be to the discretion of the Squad.

Article IV

Qualifications: Any person of good character shall be eligible for membership. He must master the equipment and pass the required course of first aid as specified by the Squad.

Article V

The officers shall consist of a President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, Reporter and Historian, elected by a majority vote of the Squad. There shall be elected by and from the Squad a Captain, First Lt., Second Lt. and Equipment Manager. There shall also be elected a Legal Advisor and a Medical Advisor. Voting in each instance shall be by secret ballot and a majority of members present shall elect.

Article VI

Duties

- President:** He shall be responsible for the general welfare and development of the Squad and act in an advisory capacity on all matters pertaining to its conduct.
- Vice Pres:** In the absence of the President he shall perform the duties of the President.
- Secretary:** He shall keep records of all proceedings of the Squad drills and of all meetings.
- Treasurer:** He shall receive all moneys designated to the Treasury of the Squad and shall give receipts. He shall keep an accurate record of all receipts and disbursements and shall at the first drill of each month make a complete report to be adopted by the Squad. He shall make an annual written report at the end of each fiscal year, to be adopted by the Board of Directors at their organization meeting the first drill night in January. This report to be filed with the Secretary. The treasurer shall deposit all Squad funds in local bank. The Treasurer shall pay all bills as promptly as possible by check only, and only upon the order of the Squad.
- Legal Advisor:** He shall give counsel as to the conduct of parliamentary procedure and direction of correct contact with the public, the City and The Court.
- Medical Advisor:** His duty will be to assist the Squad in their efforts as outlined in the object of their organization, and administer to such patients as may come under their care.
- Captain:** He shall preside at all meetings of the Squad and have general supervision thereof. He shall be Chairman of the Program Committee. In the absence of the Treasurer he shall have the right to make disbursements of the funds of the Squad as ordered by the Squad.

First Lieutenant: He shall act in the absence of the Captain, assuming his duties. He shall be Chairman of the Membership Committee.

Second Lieutenant: He shall act in the absence of the Captain and First Lieutenant. He shall be Chairman of the Sick Committee.

Equipment Manager: He shall have charge of all equipment and its repair. He shall have the authority to appoint an assistant with the approval of the Captain and the Squad.

Article VII

Regular drills shall be held as provided for in the By-Laws.

Article VIII

The following committees shall be - Executive, Program, Membership, Sick, and Finance.

Article IX

Duties of Members: They shall attend Squad Drills and They shall attend Squad Calls.

Article X

The election of officers shall be held at the first meeting in December of each year. At such meeting a nomination committee of three, named by the Captain at the first November meeting of each year, shall make its report. Elections shall then be held. The officers elected in the first December meeting of each year shall be installed at or before the first meeting in January of each year, and they shall serve for a period of one year, or until their successors shall be named. In addition to the slate of nominees presented by the nominating committee, nominations for each office may also be made from the floor. By secret ballot, a majority shall be necessary to elect.

Article XI

Board of Directors shall consist of all elected officers. The said Directors so elected shall have the power to fill vacancies in their own body from the membership of the Squad in the interval between the annual elections. The said board shall have charge of the interest and all affairs of the Squad. They shall have the power, authority and privilege to do any and all acts which the members do pertaining to the affairs of the Squad, except as otherwise provided by Law.

Article XII

Board Meetings. The Board of Directors shall meet twice a year at such hour and place as the President may designate to each member on record at least seven days prior to such meeting. Special meetings of the Board may be called by the President or Captain and notice of such meetings shall be given by the secretary to all members of the Board at least twenty-four hours prior to such meeting. A quorum for any meeting of the Board shall be a majority of the duly qualified and elected Directors. At each meeting each Director shall be entitled to cast one vote in person or proxy.

Article XIII

No amendment shall be made to this Constitution unless submitted in writing at a regular meeting, which proposed amendment shall be referred to a special committee

which shall report thereon within thirty days when it may be acted upon and adopted by a two-thirds Vote of the Squad members.

Article VI
Duties (Con't.)

Publicity Director: He shall compile and keep up-to-date in written form an accurate and detailed history of the Squad from its beginning down through the succeeding periods of election. He shall place the Squad and Squad activities in the public eye and get out programs educating the public as to the work of the Squad, with the assistance of the officers and Squad. He shall be in charge of all publicity used to further Squad purposes.

Chaplain: He shall be at each regular meeting of the Squad and contribute something to the spiritual welfare of its members.

SCHEDULE OF COVERAGES

If the word "None" is stated before any coverage, Insurance is not afforded for such coverage.

Table with 2 columns: Amount and Coverage Description. Rows include Total Disability - Weekly Indemnity (\$30.00), Death, Dismemberment and Loss of Sight (\$5,000.00), and Medical Expense (\$1,000.00).

The above Insured Member is covered under a Volunteer Organization Accident Policy issued by the Glens Falls Insurance Company (hereinafter called the Company), against loss as afforded in the Schedule of Coverages resulting directly and independently of all other causes from accidental bodily injuries herein called such injuries, sustained while this policy is in force covering:

Volunteer members in good standing, including any who may receive a retainer, while actually on duty with the Unit (including while going to or returning from emergency duties, at meetings, drills, parades, or at tests or trials of any equipment of the Unit) and not otherwise.

Section 1. WEEKLY INDEMNITY FOR TOTAL DISABILITY

If such injuries shall, within 30 days from the date of accident, wholly and continuously disable and prevent the Insured Member from performing any and every kind of duty pertaining to his usual occupation, the Company will pay weekly indemnity periodically at the rate stated in the Schedule of Coverages, if indicated as covered therein, for the period of such continuous total disability, but not exceeding One Hundred and Four (104) consecutive weeks.

If such injuries shall result in the death of the Insured Member or dismemberment or loss of sight as listed and defined in Section 2, the Company will pay weekly indemnity as provided herein up to the date of death or to the date of dismemberment or loss of sight.

Section 2. DEATH, DISMEMBERMENT AND LOSS OF SIGHT

If such injuries shall, within 90 days from the date of accident, result in any one of the losses listed below, the Company will pay the amount shown, if indicated as covered in the Schedule of Coverages, but only one amount, the largest, will be paid for such injuries sustained by one Insured Member and resulting from one accident.

The benefit payable will be the percentage indicated below of the amount of coverage specified in the Schedule of Coverages.

For Loss of:

Table listing loss types and percentages: Life (100%), Both Hands or Both Feet or Sight of Both Eyes (100%), One Hand and One Foot (100%), One Leg by actual severance through or above the Knee Joint (75%), One Arm by actual severance through or above the Elbow Joint (60%), One Hand or One Foot or Sight of One Eye (50%), Thumb and Index Finger of One Hand (25%).

RENEWABLE ONLY AT OPTION OF COMPANY

Loss resulting from Dismemberment or Loss of Sight shall mean, with regard to hands and feet, actual severance through or above wrist or ankle joints; with regard to eyes, entire and irrecoverable loss of sight; with regard to thumb and index finger, actual severance through or above metacarpo-phalangeal joints.

Section 3. MEDICAL EXPENSE

If such injuries shall, within 26 weeks from the date of accident, require medical or surgical treatment, hospital confinement, or the employment of a trained nurse, the Company will pay, in addition to any other indemnity to which the Insured Member may be entitled, the actual expense of such treatment, hospital charges, and nurses' fees, but not exceeding, for any one accident, the amount specified in the Schedule of Coverages, if indicated as covered therein.

INSURED MEMBERS

The Company will furnish to an executive officer of the Unit, for delivery to each member who is insured under this Policy an individual certificate setting forth a statement as to the insurance protection to which he is entitled and to whom payable and such limitations and requirements in this policy as may pertain to such member. All new members of the Unit who are accepted to membership shall become insured under this policy as of the effective date of such membership.

EXCLUSIONS

This policy does not cover death, disability, medical expense or other loss caused directly or indirectly by: (1) Sickness, disease or infection, except pyogenic infection which shall occur through an accidental cut or wound; (2) Inguinal Hernia; (3) Suicide or any attempt thereat; (4) War, declared or undeclared, or any act thereof; (5) Injury sustained while operating, learning to operate, or serving as a member of the crew of any aircraft, or while in any aircraft used for test, exhibition or experimental purpose or operated by or under direction of any military authority.

RENEWABLE AT OPTION OF COMPANY



1. Road-test vehicle for engine, clutch, transmission, axle, brake and steering operations and make necessary corrections.
2. Adjust valve tappets.
3. Set ignition timing.
4. Test all lights and adjust aim if required.
5. Check and fill battery with distilled water.
6. Tighten starter, battery, generator electrical connections.
7. Check operation of all instruments.
8. Check operation of door locks, hinges, window regulators and windshield wipers.

In accordance with my promise to you we wish to submit proposal for coverage of the Raleigh Emergency Rescue Squad for a blanket accident policy.

Briefly, policy can be issued providing \$5,000 principal sum (death benefit). Cost of this portion of policy being \$50.00. Policy would provide \$30.00 per week for lost time - maximum 104 weeks. Cost of this portion of policy \$48.00. Blanket medical expense in the amount of \$1,000 per accident (per individual), cost being \$55.00.

The total cost to the squad for a policy covering all members against accident while in line of duty as member of the rescue squad including going to and from such emergencies would be \$153.00 per year. Again repeating, this would provide \$5,000 death benefit; \$30.00 per week disability; \$1,000 blanket medical expense.
